BIOL845 Forensic Biology Fall 2023

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Forensic Biology studies biology and earth science by engaging in investigations of how scientific evidence is used to solve crimes. Students take on the roles of public safety professionals to identify, collect, preserve, test, and analyze physical evidence ranging from general considerations to the latest in molecular techniques. Students will review current literature, discuss case studies, and look at some mass market publications on crime scene investigation.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

- 1) learn how and why evidence can be used to solve crime
- 2) how biogeological processes affect the preservation and viability of physical evidence
- 3) explain the scientific principles
- 4) professional report writing

COURSE MATERIALS

Grades are based on participation and quality of discussion, quizzes, exams, and assignments. Students are expected to interact with other classmates on Canvas weekly discussion board. The quality of the discussion is exhibited by the contribution of original ideas, respect for differing opinions, and evidence of knowledge on the subject matter. Students are required to maintain a professional and cordial mannerism when communicating with the instructor and other students. When you are taking an online course, it is expected that you will read all of the materials and keep up with due dates on your own. I will not be reminding you of the due dates for the course. The calendar I created has all of the course due dates and you should be sure to download it and either transfer the dates to your calendar or keep a copy to make sure you don't miss any due dates. Students are encouraged to communicate with the instructor by email about their questions and concerns for the class contents, assignments, quizzes, and exams. EXAMS: There are one Mid Exam and one Final Exam throughout the semester composed of multiple choice, short answer, and essay questions. Mid Exam covers the materials from week 1 to 4, while Final Exam is comprehensive. Respondus Lockdown Browser is required for online exams and quizzes. The amount of time allotted will be announced at the time of the test. If you run out of time while taking the test, you will not be given extra time. If you have a problem while taking your test, send me an email and I will deal with it as soon as possible. The computer displays a message to me that tells me what kind of problem you had, whether you took too much time or there was a computer problem. You must take both mid and final exams to receive full credit. If you miss either exam, you will automatically fail and receive a letter grade of an "F". The exam will be available on Monday of the week and taken off on the dates listed in Grading Scheme. THE DEADLINE IS FINAL! The tests will be removed at 11:59 pm CT on the due date. Makeup exams will be given only under extreme or extenuating circumstances, which can be documented! In any and all cases, the final validity and acceptability of any excuse for absence are at the instructor's discretion. The grading will be finished within a week after the guizzes, exams, and assignments are closed.

QUIZZES: Throughout the semester, you will be given 6 timed quizzes worth 10 points each, which will be taken using the Respondus Lockdown Browser. The quizzes will cover the book/lecture materials. The dates for the quizzes will be open at 8:00 am CT on the Monday of the week and closed at 11:59 pm CT on Sunday of the week. If you run out of time while taking the quiz, you will not be given extra time. If you have a problem while taking your quiz, send me an email and I will deal with it as soon as possible. **THE DEADLINE IS FINAL! The quiz will be removed at 11:59 pm CT on the Sunday due date.**

FINAL CASE STUDY REPORT: Students will have one report writing assignment, which is due on October 10th Tuesday by 11:59 pm CT. In the first week you are provided a forensic scenario case study question. You will have 8 weeks to apply what you have learned during the semester to write a case study report. **THE DEADLINE IS FINAL!** You are to format the document as follows with 1" margins all around, 12pt Arial font, Single spacing, Students name in the *right hand corner of the header*, Case Study and the date in *left hand corner of the header*. Please turn in your report early.

ASSIGNMENTS: Students are to finish three assignments or paper reviews (20 points each) related to your learning materials throughout the semester. You are to format the document as follows with 1" margins all around, 12pt Arial font, Single spacing, Students name in the *right hand corner of the header*, Assignment # and the date in *left hand corner of the header*.

DISCUSSION BOARD: There are six graded weekly Discussion Boards worth 10 points each. You are expected to communicate with your classmates during Week 1, 2, 3, 5, 6, and 7. In Week 1 you are to post a self-introduction to let other classmates know more about you. Since Week 2, <u>you are to post at least one short paragraph every week</u> **a)** to summarize a forensic biology research paper / a forensic case related to the weekly learning materials (the references should be included); OR **b)** to share your ideas / questions about the weekly contents / the final case study. <u>Your weekly post is due on Friday</u> of the week to give your group mates enough time to respond. <u>Every week you are to reply to at least two posts from the other group mates</u>. Your response / comments will be due on Sunday of the week. Each weekly discussion will be scored out of 10 points. <u>You will be graded not on the number of posts per week but on the **quality** of posts.</u>

The score for your posts will be based upon:

- a) Critical thinking (a post rich in content and full of insight)
- b) Connection with real-life situations
- c) Uniqueness (new ideas and new connections)
- d) Depth and detail of posts
- e) Respect for classmates
- f) Discussion with classmates
