Biology 813: Issues in Bioethics Spring 2022

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Bioethics is the study of ethical controversies in both biology and medicine. Science has progressed significantly in the last century and with this progress has come ethical questions. The intent of this course is to focus on a variety of issues that have arisen, including, but not limited to, assisted reproductive technologies, sex selection, cloning, and stem cell research to name a few.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

- 1) To gain a broad background in biology and ethics.
- 2) To be able to make an informed analysis of bioethical issues.
- To critically discuss bioethical issues in a group setting. Students will achieve these objectives through quizzes, discussion board, and writing a critical overview.

COURSE MATERIALS

Grades are based on participation and quality of discussion, weekly quizzes, a final comprehensive exam, and one writing assignment. There are no taped lectures for this course. Students must participate online for all discussion topics. The week runs from the Monday through the Sunday listed in the syllabus. Make sure you don't miss any due dates. The quality of the discussion is exhibited by the contribution of original ideas, respect for differing opinions, and evidence of knowledge on the subject matter. Students are required to maintain a professional and cordial mannerism when communicating with the instructor and other students. Students are encouraged to communicate with the instructor by email about their questions and concerns. I will check my email Mondays to Fridays between 9 am and 5 pm CST. I do not check email after 5 pm CST and rarely on weekends. I will respond to your emails within 24 hours.

DISCUSSION BOARD: You are posting as part of a **discussion**, not just for points. Each chapter/week discussion will be scored out of 10 points. You need to post during the week and weekend. You will be graded not on the number of posts per week (two is the minimum to get a score of any type for each guestion, it does NOT guarantee you will earn all the points possible), but on the **quality** of posts. At least **one post** per discussion board must have a peer-reviewed science (not ethics or bioethics) reference attached to it. Your **other post(s)** can have a Bioethics or ethics reference if you wish. This is a good practice in having an informed opinion. You are to be prepared to discuss the questions, instead of simply agreeing with each other! The week runs from the Monday through the Sunday as listed above.

The score for your posts will be based upon:

- a) Critical thinking (a post rich in content and full of insight)
- b) Connection with issue and real-life situations
- c) Uniqueness (new ideas and new connections)
- d) Depth and detail of posts
- e) Respect for classmates
- f) **Discussion with classmates** (if you wait until Saturday & Sunday and are discussing with yourself or one other person, you get 0 points!)

QUIZZES: Throughout the semester, you will be given 13 timed quizzes worth 10 points each. Respondus Lockdown Browser is required for online exams and quizzes. In addition, the first week introductions will be counted as a quiz score. The quizzes will cover the book material. You will be allotted to answer 5 multiple choice, short answer, or true/false questions. You will have only one chance to answer the question. Therefore, make sure to answer carefully. If you run out of time while taking the quiz, you will NOT be given extra time. If you have a problem while taking your quiz, send me an email and I will deal with it as soon as possible. The computer displays a message that tells me what kind of problem you had, whether you took too much time or there was a computer problem. Everyone is expected to take all of the quizzes. The dates for the quizzes are listed on the schedule and will be open at 8:00 am CST on the Monday of the week and closed at 11:00 pm CST on Sunday of the week. The purpose of these quizzes is to make sure that you are keeping up with the course material.

POSITION PAPER: Students will have one formal writing assignment, which is a position paper on "When does life begin". Specific details on this writing assignment will be provided for you on Canvas. For every day the report is late, your grade will be dropped with 10% penalty. FYI, late day grading starts at midnight on March 20. Please turn your paper in early.

FINAL EXAM: There is only one exam given and it is a comprehensive exam over the entire semester. The material on the exam will cover the book material. The exam will be composed of multiple choice, short answer, or true/false questions and is taken on-line. <u>Respondus Lockdown Browser is required for online exams and quizzes.</u> Everyone is expected to take the exam.
