





#### Central Platte Natural Resources District for Board of Directors At Large - 2 Year Term




The Central Platte NRD is one of 23 natural resources districts in Nebraska. The Legislature created the NRDs in 1972 to manage water quality, water supply, soil erosion, flood control, drainage, fish and wildlife habitat, recreation and parks and range lands. Eleven counties have land included in the Central Platte NRD. The NRD's board has 21 members, each of whom serves a four-year term. For the at-large seat, incumbent Charles J. **Bicak** is a biology professor at the University of Nebraska at Kearney and has served as senior vice chancellor for academic and student affairs since 2009. He was dean of natural sciences at St. Edward's University from 2005 to 2009. He was also professor and chairman of biology at California State University, Bakersfield. He received his bachelor's degree in biology from UNK, his master's in plant science from the University of British Columbia and his doctorate in rangeland ecology from Colorado State University. "Wise decision making regarding water is the most important priority," he said. "Our board goals focus on both water quantity and quality. The CPNRD has been a leader among Nebraska's 23 NRDs, the nation and, indeed, the world in advancing creative and effective strategies for wise stewardship of water." He said water drives success in the agricultural sector. "The wide range of CPNRD responsibilities requires a board member to invest time and energy in understanding initiatives that are wide-ranging," Bicak said. "This includes understanding the rationale for concepts as varied as prescribed burns in the western rangeland areas of the district, regulation of nitrates in groundwater in the central areas and flood control in the east. Further, all that the board and CPNRD staff accomplish must be cost effective."

Ostermeier's family includes his wife, Stacey, and three grown stepchildren. He earned both his bachelor's degree and his master's from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. He has served as a soil conservationist with the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Soil Conservation Service (now the Natural Resources Conservation Service), conservation director for the Central Nebraska Public Power and Irrigation District and has been with OAK Farms since 2000. He operates a family farm operation of irrigated corn and soybeans and cattle feeding. "I became interested in water management growing up on an irrigated farm in northern Hall County," Ostermeier said. "As a mechanized systems management major at UNL, I was drawn to the soil and water classes. That led to working as a soil conservationist with NRCS. I did my master's thesis on fertigating with surge irrigation. I conducted my research and worked at the Management Systems Evaluation Area project near Shelton." As conservation director with CNPPID, he worked with surface water irrigators on irrigation water management, as well as leading the Central Nebraska Regional Water Conservation Task Force. He also developed a greater understanding of integrated management of surface water and groundwater. "I think production agriculture has the best managers of natural resources," Ostermeier said. "As a farmer, I realize the importance of soil, water and air quality in raising crops and livestock. I appreciate the role NRDs have in managing our natural resources through education and cost-share programs. That is why I would like to serve on the CPNRD board."

There are many mandates being issued by the EPA and many governmental entities that challenge NPPD daily. It is very important that a board member understands the issues facing them. We must answer the needs of our customers, while watching the costs, so that we deliver power at a competitive price.

**How would you balance the needs of government versus taxpayers' interest?** NPPD is a governmental body that must balance the issues and mandates they are faced with while controlling the cost to the rate payers. By state law, if someone requests that power be provided to them, NPPD must comply. That is the basis for public power. Nebraska is the only state that is 100 percent public power, so the board members must answer to the rate payers.
