^a Response rate (number of respondents divided by sample size) is adjusted for non-deliverable mailing addresses, students for whom no contact information was available, others who were sampled yet unavailable during the survey administration, and those who were no long eligible at the time of the survey administration.

^b This report is based on information from all sampled students for both your institution and your comparison institutions.

^c Sampling error is an estimate of the margin by which the true score for your institution on a given item could differ from the reported score. For example, if the sampling error is 5% and 60% of your students reply "very often" to a particular item, then the true population value is most likely between 55% and 65%.
